

Number of reported cases and clearance rate: Penal Code offenses (1946-2016)



Reported Penal Code Offenses

- fell below one million (approx. 996,000)
- decreased for 14 consecutive years
- a post-war low
- O *Theft* 723,148 cases
 - ... accounts for 72.6% of all Penal Code Offenses
- **Fraud** 40,990 cases
 - ... increasing since 2012
- *Injury* 24,365 cases *Assault* 31,813 cases
 - ...a slight decrease from the previous year yet both remain high

Some Offenses to be noted

- O Cleared offenses of *Child Abuse*, *Spousal Violence* and *Stalking* are on the rise.
- O Drug Offenses; The number of persons cleared for

Stimulants Control Act violations remained over 10,000.

Cannabis Control Act violations have increased for three consecutive years.

(2 yr.) Reimprisonment Rate

those inmates reimprisoned by the year-end of 2016 after the release from prison in 2015 all released inmates in 2015


The Elderly (65 yrs old and older)

approx. 20% of all persons cleared for Penal Code offenses


approx. 70% of the elderly who entered prison in 2015 have previous imprisonment history

among those elderly released from prison in 2015, those reimprisoned by year-end 2016 account for 23.2%


