Opening Remarks by SUZUKI Keisuke, the Minister of Justice of Japan, for the 4th Tokyo Immigration Forum

I truly believe that coordination and cooperation between our immigration authorities will be enhanced through the Forum, which will also contribute greatly to the international community.

Now, I invite you all to participate in the dialogue by actively sharing your ideas and knowledge. Let me conclude my opening remarks by expressing my high hope that this 4th Forum will be an opportunity for us to take a positive step together toward resolving issues in our countries and regions.
